

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

The IQAC works with untiring zeal to give the best of modern, scientific and technological education to the marginalised students among the marginalized . To bring these deprived girl students at par with the other students who form the creamy layer, is an uphill task. Nonetheless the IQAC is geared to fulfil this responsibility of the institution with utmost sincerity.

- Teaching learning methods were improved. The modular curricula was followed strictly, half yearly exam was held and the College library was digitized. All these measures provided sound academic grooming to the students and consequently four students of the college secured above 72% marks. Ms. Muzna Maqsood, B.A.III secured 73% marks and stood 3rd in the University Merit List. Ms. Hena Naz, B.A.II, Zeenat Zia, B.A.I, Farha Bano, B.Com.I secured above 72% marks.
- Environment of cooperation and cyclic relationship between students and faculty.
- Centre for Women's Studies taking direction from IQAR brought the significant contribution of the eminent freedom fighter and founder of the college, Begum Khursheed Khwaja to the light of the people. She established Hamidia educational institutions at Allahabad in 1932 when there was not a single school to cater to the educational needs of the purdah-observing girls of the minority community. She sowed the seed of the Hamidia Primary School which has developed into a Degree College, an institute of higher education. Her noble services have helped the college to achieve the true spirit of education of taking inspiration from the wise and courageous elders of the community.
- First Begum Khursheed Khawaja Memorial Lecture was held on the occasion of her 117 birth anniversary .The college paid homage to her pioneering and selfless services in the field of Muslim girl education at Allahabad.
- Digitization of the Library was a major milestone covered by the IQAC.
- Vocational training was imparted to students.
- Human resource was mobilized through the activities of Computer Lab, Language Lab.
- Further Urdu Coaching and Urdu Calligraphy course sanctioned by U.P. Urdu Academy also prove highly beneficial to the students.

2.15 Plan of Action by IQAC/Outcome

The plan of action chalked out by the IQAC in the beginning of the year towards quality enhancement and the outcome achieved by the end of the year \ast

Plan of Action

- The Academic Advisory Committee was motivated by the Principal to prepare academic calendar for the year.
- At the regular staff meetings between the Principal and Staff members, steps to improvise teaching methods were discussed.
- Centre for Women's Studies was instructed to plan its own calendar and carry out its activities. It geared up its research on empowered women who were the true activities of modern India.
- Work on Digitization of Library should be accelerated.
- More students should be given vocational training.
- Language Lab was established and put in the charge of senior teacher. It provided proficiency training in English and Urdu.
- Remedial Coaching classes were conducted in Urdu, Ancient History, Economics and Computer Application and Education.
- Urdu Coaching classes were held regularly under the charge of a teacher. Similarly Urdu Calligraphy training was also given to students.
- Vigilance Awareness Week held from 31st October- 5th November 2011.
- Creative Fashion Centre established.

Achievements

- Academic Calendar formed and activities were held all round in the year according to the calendar.
- Consequently 4 students of the College secured above 73% marks.
- Centre for Women's Studies drew out its own plan a set of activities keeping in mind its two key areas of action – proving legal literacy and improving women's health. The CWS undertook deep study on the contribution of the pillars of society and brought to light the work of Begum Khursheed Khwaja, Founder of the College. First Begum Khursheed Khwaja Memorial Lecture held.
- The target was met. It was inaugurated on 5th November, 2011.
- Three months free of cost training in computer typing and internet access was given to students at the Computer Lab.
- Four batches of 20 students each benefitted.
- Classes were held study materials were provided to the students.
- 30 students were beneficiaries of Urdu Coaching
- 10 students were beneficiaries of Urdu calligraphy.
- Students participated enthusiastically.
- Semi skilled students were framed into skilled students.

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

- Empowerment of girl students in particular and women in general is the mission of the College. Bearing this in mind the College authorities have closely followed various women welfare programmes. Two seminars were organized in a row by the Centre for Women' Studies at the College a) Women and Property Rights in India (22nd September, 2011) b) Women Well-Being and Positive Health Care (25th September, 2011). Hon'ble Mr. Justice Arun Tondon, Mrs. Divya Misra, Chairperson, UP State Social welfare Board & state Minister and Prof.L.R.Singh Dean. CDC, University of Allahabad delivered their lecturer to create awareness.
- Under the Women Health Initiative Programme a Health Centre for girl students of the College is functional since October 2009. General Health examination of students is conducted by the consultant doctor and a Health Card recording the health status of examined students is issued in the name of the student. Prof. S. A. Ansari, Dept. of Commerce, A.U. Dr.Rekha Saxena, Ophthalmologist, M.N. District Hospital, Alld, Dr. Najmi Rehman, director, TIAHS and Dr. Kaleem Akmal discussed health related issues.
- Centre for Women's Studies has also established a Fitness Centre equipped with five exercisers where students are trained in aerobics and other fitness regimen.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Curriculum are designed by the University of Allahabad.
- Our College teachers are members of Board of Baccalaureate studies and their suggestions are incorporated regarding modification of under graduate syllabus.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Teaching and learning scheduled events include Class Tests, Internal Assessment and University Examination.
- Language Lab is an efficient means for the enrichment of the spoken language learning process. Language Lab equipped with 21 computer sets enables students to improve their proficiency skill of spoken English, under the supervision of the subject teacher through ETNL Language Lab Software.
 - Language Lab is playing a constructive role not only for the students desirous of acquiring proficiency in spoken English but also for those students who wish to attain proficiency in spoken Urdu.
- In the XI Plan UGC provision to provide grant for Remedial Coaching is a boon for educationally disadvantaged students at graduate level. Remedial Coaching is running in the session 2011-12. 300 students were enrolled and coaching classes were held in 5 subjects Urdu, Education, History, Economics and CASS. All the candidates were successful in their exams in this session. Students performance is assessed through tests and assignments.
- This year Vigilance Awareness Week (31st October to 5th November 2011) has been observed in the college with so much zeal and enthusiasm. During this week students participated in different activities like essay competition, poetry, collage, slogan, poster and debate. Students raised their voice against corruption and were of the view that education can play vital role in the eradication of corruption.
- Three girls showed remarkable academic excellence. Miss Muzna Maqsood stood third in University Faculty Merit List by securing 73% marks in B.A. III. Miss Hena Naz B.A.II secured 70.88% Miss Zeenat Zia B.A. I secured 69.9% Miss Farha Bano B.Com.I secured 66.8%
- Urdu Day was celebrated on 9th November 2011. Competition in Essay Writing on the topic "Urdu Zaban Aur Hamari Zimmedari" and self composed poems on "Urdu Zaban" were organized to know the students thinking and bent of mind.
- Hindi Day was celebrated on 14th September, 2011. A symposium was organized on this occasion "Hindi Ki Sanvaidhanik Aur Vaidhanik Stitithi" was the topic. The Chief-Guest Prof. Ram Kishor Sharma, A.U. and Prof. Mushtaq Ali, A.U. was the main speaker. Poster competition on "Rashtra Nirman Bharha", Essay competition on "Hindi Ki Rashtra Bhasha Ke Roop Mein Stithi" and self composed poetry competition on "Naari" was organized and students expressed their talents and experiences.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Half yearly assessment is conducted in month of December to prepare the students for final examination University conducts the annual examination from the first week of March to 15th May. The college is a centre for the exams. Institution authorities maintain strict vigil to ensure that no case of unfair means may occur. The results are published on University website and leading local newspapers. The teachers are also nominated for paper setting and evaluation by the University.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Seminar on "Women and Property Rights in India" was organized (22nd September 2011) to provide legal awareness to students. Mrs. Divya Mishra, Chairperson, U.P. State Social Welfare Board and State Minister was the Chief-Guest. Hon'ble Mr. Justice Arun Tondon from the High Court, Allahabad, Prof. L.R. Singh, A.U. delivered their lecture on the topic. They motivated the girl students to keep themselves abreast of the different women welfare schemes of the government. Prof. R. Khanna, A.U., Prof. Shailendra Tiwari, SIEMAT, Dr. Anshuman Mishra, A.U. etc discussed the theme.
- Another Seminar on "Women Well-Being and Positive Health Care" was organized by the Centre on 25th September 2011. Prof. S.A. Ansari, A.U. was the chief-guest, Dr. Kaleem Akmal, Deputy CMO, Alld., Dr. Anjum Ahmad, Consultant Doctor, Dr. Najmi Rahman, Director, TIAHS were present.
- Two-day workshop on 5th & 6th November 2011 on the topic "Photo Journalism: Concepts, Techniques and its Relevance in Modern India" organized in order to motivate the students to take the Urdu Journalism and Mass Communication course as a profession and provide them important guidelines regarding Urdu Journalism. The Chief-guest was Prof. G.K. Rai, Director, IPS, A.U. ,Ms. Fatima, Dept. of Journalism, J.M.I., Prof. Suhail Akbar, JMI hoped that the girls will be empowered by this workshop. They emphasized the importance of reading and studying. They asked the students to read more and more with analytical thinking and then to reach on any conclusion.

After inaugural session students were trained during workshop on representation in television journalism and documentary. Students from different colleges and university attended the workshop.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Internet service is provided to the students. Students can download the articles when required by them in the library.

The tremendous progress made in the field of information technology has helped the teacher and the taught to a great extent. The college students have now the facility to acquire knowledge through IT from any part of the world. This has turned into a possibility as the College Library has been digitized from 5th November 2011. At present digital library is equipped with 9 client PCs and one server computer.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Human resource management is designed to maximize employee performance in service of their employer's strategic objectives .Teaching and non-teaching staff are managed focusing on policies and systems.
